Purpose of Early Intervention

"To enable young children to be active and successful participants during the early childhood years and in the future in a variety of settings – in their homes, with their families, in child care, in preschool, and in the community."



What is Early Intervention?

Early intervention is a system of supports and services that helps eligible infants and toddlers with developmental delays or disabilities in the first three years of life. In early intervention, service providers coach families to help their children with the needs that they have within their daily routines. Early Intervention may include speech therapy, physical therapy, and other types of services based on the child and family's needs within the following areas of development: physical, cognitive, communication, social/emotional, and self-help skills.

What is Early On?

Early On is Michigan's statewide system of early intervention services administered by the Michigan Department of Lifelong Education, Advancement, and Potential (MiLEAP). Services are provided by Intermediate School Districts in the child's natural environment (in the family's home, child care, or a community setting).







Early On

Early On provides supports and services for eligible infants and toddlers, birth to three years of age who have a disability or who are at risk for delay(s) due to an established health condition. Early On also provides supports and resources to assist family members and caregivers.

Could You Be an *Early On* Service Provider?

Early Interventionists provide families with the supports and services that will promote the development of their infants and toddlers with developmental delays or disabilities.

Service providers assist children and families with the needs that they have within their daily routines through coaching.





Early On service providers support children in the following developmental areas:

- Physical (reaching, rolling, crawling, and walking)
- Cognitive (thinking, learning, solving problems)
- Communication (talking, listening, understanding, gesturing)
- Social-emotional (feeling secure, able to calm, playing with others)
- Self-help (eating, dressing)
